# Math Online

Math Online is an easy to use math program and it's linked to Australian States and Territory curriculums.

A free trial is available. They also have a special homeschool discount. Lessons are engaging but free from the distractions that other online math programs have. I used it with all 4 of my children.

Assessing progress is easily. You can also quickly work through lessons seeing if your child understands a concept or if they need more work. This is great for remedial work or if you want to fast track your child.

## Resource 4

# Australian Curriculum

The Australian National Curriculum is the standardised education syllabi around Australia. Queensland, Northern Territory, ACT, South Australia and Tasmania have all followed the Australian Curriculum as laid out on the government website. NSW, WA and Victoria have incorporated the national curriculum into their own state syllabi.

In NSW, they use additional outcome codes to the Australian Curriculum (just to confuse you). The NESA (NSW) syllabus is in 2-3 year blocks called stages: Stage 1 (Grade K-2), Stage 2 (Grade 3-4), Stage 3 (Grade 5-6), Stage 4 (Grade 7-8), Stage 5 (Grade 9-10), Stage 6 (Grade 11-12). However, it is still basically the same curriculum with some content sequence and wording variations.

# Australian Home School Registration Applications

Legally children in Australia between the ages of 6 to 15 need to be at school or homeschooled. From 15 to 17 children can leave school as long as they meet state educational or vocational requirements. (This varies slightly between states).

To be registered you must apply to the state or territory in which you are a resident. You cannot register to homeschool in Australia if you are living overseas, or have no fixed address.

Each state has their own regulation for homeschooling.
